Roc Day 2024 Update

Based on the accolades we received from our neighboring guilds, Roc Day was a success!

Particular praise went to the goodie bags (thank you, Nancy! And Sheri for donating the bags), door prizes (thank you Donna, the gift wrapping was a nice touch) and the venue. I guess I am not the only one who loves the Craft Center and people liked the spinning circle, which is traditional. Several people also remarked that the food was plentiful and good.

We had 70 attendees, including Craft Center staff. In comparison, there were nearly 100 people registered in 2020, based on the spreadsheet that Kathy Perito, the 2020 chair, shared. I had hoped for 50! I have never been happier to be that wrong!



We had a couple of challenges all based on the time frame: we organized Roc Day in half the time that it usually takes. I will list those challenges so that future committees (I do hope there will be future Roc Days, but not with me as the chair!) avoid them if possible.

One challenge was ordering the food. I shamelessly and without even asking, used Kathy Perito's registration form from 2020, changing dates and other information as needed. Cleverly Kathy had planned for the food ahead of time and the choices were in the registration form. I knew I wanted to use Mangia Bene both from my experience and on the recommendation of Sheri Cox who says they do a lot of catering at the Craft Center. They are very flexible with people's individual dietary needs. But there was no time for details as the registration form was already going out late. I would use Mangia Bene again. This meant more time to receive people's choices, but with no difficulties from the point of view of attendees.

The other change I would make is to use an app or an on-line service for the registration fees. Terry suggested it, but, again, there was no time to set it up before the registration had to go out. Handling checks was more time consuming, but Heather and I worked well together and when all was said and done, there was only one check lost in the mail; we accepted the attendee, and she later sent us a check. But there is no recourse for people who don't remember whether they registered or not! In the future I would use electronic means for registration and payment, but we must remember that not everyone is comfortable with the technology and we should accept checks as an option.

I was worried about the goodie bags because of my incorrect estimate of 50. Nearly everyone who promised came through with donations, but generally 50 items. However, Nancy cleverly distributed the items so that, while not all bags were the same, there were enough goodies that everyone was happy. Had we started planning earlier, we would have had a better idea of the number of attendees and could have gotten the goodies for all the bags, but really that was a minor problem.



Everything else worked well: Marva's pouches were great, the registration desk with Jeanne Marie and Janet worked smoothly, Beth and Judy made the guild a nice sum of money with the de-stashing table, and Alma covered all bases. Lots of other people helped, of course, and I will include a list in my final report for the secretary's files.




Loom for Loan
